Registration Issues

SUNY Old Westbury students and staff have complaints when it comes to registering for classes. Sophomore Gabriella Guerrero almost lost her financial aid due to registration issues. Dean of Students Rollie Buchanan believes that the availability of classes does not meet student needs. Assistant Director of First-Year Experience Cynthia Anderson said that there were a lot more first-year students enrolled than expected this year, which caused an overflow in general education courses.

Guerrero began her sophomore year with two classes, when she initially signed up for four, the semester before. "One of my classes was dropped sometime late July, but I did not receive any call or email," she said. "It was not until I checked my portal during August, and I saw it was cancelled. There was no reason to why it was cancelled either." She added that on her first day of school, she got a phone call from the professor of another class, stating that it was permanently cancelled because of lack of student enrollment. "It was literally six hours before my class that I received that call.'

Guerrero had to immediately add two classes to her schedule, or else she would have not received financial aid. In order to receive financial aid, a student has to be enrolled full-time, which consists of twelve or more credits. Guerrero stated that she is not satisfied with the classes she is enrolled in.

Buchanan stated that there is a lack of availability of classes. Some classes students need to take are available at the same time, forcing students to choose one and wait another semester to take the other. Also, there are prerequisite classes, having to take one class in order to get into another. The problem with that is that "not all class-

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THE RENOVATED LIBRARY

Students may only have access to one floor in the library, but there are new features such as more space, new furniture, more computers, and a self-use copy machine. The library also has new lighting and new air-circulation. "Everyone in the library is now breathing better air," said Library Director Stephen Kirkpatrick.

The math lab and writing center that were temporarily relocated are now in the library. "We are seeing a record number of students," said Writing Center Director Jody Cardinal. Cardinal believes that one of the reasons more students are using the writing center is because it is easier to find.

The renovated library that students walked into this fall was a project

that was supposed to be finished in the spring, however, due to construction issues, it was delayed. The library reconstruction project that started in June 2012 is projected to finish in the summer of 2016 costing an estimated \$20 million

By the summer of 2015, the main floor and some of the second will be completed. The side of the main floor that is still being constructed will consist of mostly bookshelves. The second floor will have private and group rooms available for students to use.

Kirkpatrick said that there will be conference rooms and hopefully a media lab when the library is all done. "The visual arts department as well as media students could have their own lab upstairs," he said.

The state sells bonds to make capital projects such the renovations to the

Does Yes Mean Yes at Old West?

ew York Governor Andrew Cuomo has made a call to action for SUNY schools to revamp their handling of sexual assaults by stressing the necessity of consent. In an October 2nd, news conference the NY governor called for SUNY Colleges to lead by example, "It is not SUNY's problem by origination," he said. "I would suggest it should be SUNY's problem to solve and SUNY's place to lead."

Old Westbury President Calvin O. Butts, III has urged students, faculty, staff, and alumni to use social media and participate in the White House's

sexual assault prevention on college campuses campaign, "It's on Us." California law-

makers made his-



tory on September 28th by passing the "Yes Means Yes" law, inherently transforming the subjective "No Means No" platform into something more precise.

Consent means "an affirmative, unambiguous and conscious decision" by both people to partake in sexual activity according to the bill, promoted by Los Angeles Democratic Senator Kevin de Leon. This obliterates the grey area that places the responsibility on the alleged victims, in cases where parties may have been somehow inebriated or otherwise unable to consent to sexual advances. With the formation of a White House task force to battle sexual assault, the "It's On Us" national educational campaign and the refocusing of Title 9 (a law that fights discrimination based on sex, that threatens a college's government funding for inaction/underreporting of crimes, includ ing sexual assault) college campuses

library. Budget proposals are waiting to be approved by the state so the library can be finished. Therefore, there is no official date that the library will be finished.

The money used for the library construction comes from capital funds, not the college's money. Students' college tuition does not go to these renovations. "What the tuition does go to are the books and database," said Kirkpatrick. He stresses that students do actually use the resources they pay for, including the library's database. He wants students to use the website and the communication services that are provided. "If students are having problems with the database, no matter where they are, they can call us or text us," said Kirkpatrick.

es are always offered," said Buchanan. This may delay graduation.

"Life isn't perfect," said Registrar Patricia Smith, discussing Guerrero's case. Smith stated that although it was an unfortunate event, when there are not enough students enrolled in a class, it must be dropped due to budgeting.

Some situations, such as Guerrero's case, are unpredictable. Therefore,
Smith suggests that students constantly
check their email and student portal.
She added that students should register
early and make sure their account has
no holds.

According to Smith, every first-year student needs to meet with an advisor to receive a pin in order to enroll in classes. However, after the first year, students no longer need to meet with their advisors to receive a pin. Since some classes are not always offered, and others need a prerequisite, Smith still advises all students to see an advisor to guide them to choosing classes.

Smith confirmed that there were more first-year students admitted than planned for the fall 2014 semester. She stated that it is difficult when the school prepares for a certain number of students and enrolls more.

Buchanan agrees with Smith that the best thing to do when students register is to meet with their advisors even when they are no longer in the firstyear. "When students do not meet with their advisors, they make take courses they don't need or that don't count," Buchanan said.

nation-wide have been feeling the pressure to act.

The meeting point for the differing parties involved seemed to be that conversations on campuses nationwide need to change. Leading the way in altering the tone amongst colleges are the University of Kentucky and the University of New Hampshire, with their SHARPP (Sexual Harassment and Rape Prevention Program) and VIP (Violence Intervention & Prevention center) respectively. These programs focus on bystander training, so outside parties can know how to assess and quell a potentially dangerous situation.

The "Yes means Yes" bill is the first of its kind to be passed but the need to combat acquaintance, date or nonforcible rape (the term non-forcible is used when one party is unable to legally consent) has been a significant conversation at colleges for years— for example, a story on Rohypnol (the date rape drug) entitled "Roofies: The Date-rape Drug" appeared in a 1996 issue of *Newsweek* magazine.

The idea of acquaintance rape has been brought to the forefront and for good reasons. Acquaintance Rape doesn't always include the concrete crime of being drugged and assaulted. In situations where there had been a history of mutual interest people tend to not sympathize with the victims. The consensus seems to be that if you have agreed to engage in *anything* sexual with a person, you have agreed to engage in everything sexual with a person. Activist Sofie Karasek explained to *The Detroit Free Press*, "There's this pervasive idea that if it's not super violent, it doesn't count."

Unreasonable as it may sound, it's a culture symptom that's prevalent on many college campuses, including our own. "We just didn't believe her," recalls an Old Westbury alumna, who was promised anonymity, referring to her

first year roommate who revealed that she had been raped by her boyfriend's best friend while intoxicated. "I'm ashamed to say it, I consider myself a feminist and I had no reason not to believe her. We just assumed she got drunk and didn't want to admit that she slept with this guy."

Soon enough, it became an unspoken pseudo-truth among their circle of friends that the co-ed was simply "loose." And what about her roommate's allegations? "She just kind of, stopped talking about it," added the alumna. These stories aren't rare either. The dichotomy of rape culture is prevalent, whether it's on small scale like the student who was met with a wink and a nod last semester as she ate a lollipop in class or the more significant examples.

An Old Westbury Junior explained a situation she experienced, "I was drinking one night, and a guy I knew offered to walk with me back to my room and he tried to take my pants off, I felt violated." She reported the incident but the line of questioning and tone she perceived from her residential advisor changed her mind. "It was (a lot of) 'Well, weren't you drinking?' 'Are you sure this happened?"

Understandably, intimate and sometimes invasive questions need to be asked as the impact and repercussions of such allegations are life changing for all parties involved. However, a small number of people are trained extensively enough in a victim's pathology. A lack of intense training can set up a tricky dynamic where the intentions are good but the outcome is detrimental. This problem surfaces during some Residence Hall sex talks. "The point is to have a conversation about safe sex, hosted by the R.A.'s," one dormer confessed, "but to no fault of the R.A., it turns into guys talking about what positions they like and everyone slut-shaming."

According to the White House task force, one in five female college students say they have been sexually attacked, yet only 12% of sexual assaults are reported. The problem of sexual assault extends to the LGBT community. As reported by the Center for American Progress, "Nearly half of all bisexual men and four in ten gay men have experienced a type of sexual violence besides rape. Nearly half of all bisexual women and one in eight lesbian women have experienced rape and in a survey of transgender individuals, 64 percent said they had experienced sexual assault in their lifetimes."

As for the Old Westbury Annual Safety and Fire Report, prepared by the university police, there was only one forcible sexual assault reported for 2012-2013 and 2013-2014, and no non-forcible sexual assaults reported for both years. It's clear that sexual assault is vastly under reported and there's an array of reasons why. A complaint first goes to University Police, than to the Judicial Committee. Brian Schwirzburn, the Director of Judicial Affairs, who noted that in parallel investigations, a victim can be advised not speak to a school's judicial committee, as it can negatively impact their case in a court of law. The Counseling Center's director Dr. Trisha Billard acknowledged that coming forward is extremely difficult for most, "It's hard; [victims] have to be ready." And while there are gynecology services provided on campus, there is no way to perform a sexual assault evidence kit (Rape Kit) here, meaning a trip to the local hospital would have to be on the a victim's itinerary. So, once a victim does come forward, the process sometimes can send them back into reclusion.

SUNY Old Westbury Detective Dorothy Criscuolo has a Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) program on campus. "It's like a self-defense class but not many people know we do it," she said. But upon asking five random students about the RAD Program—which has been offered since 2005—four students were entirely unfamiliar and one student asked, "Is it the thing with the T-shirts?"

OWWR GETS "INDUSTRY LEVEL EQUIPMENT"

The Old Westbury Web Radio Station (OWWR) had its equipment updated from an analog system to a digital system.

The reconstruction started in May, and it was not until September 25th that marked one week of radio station staff doing programming. "Since the reconstruction took an entire summer, we had to use another studio for live broadcast-

ing," said Program Director Jean Beaute. Although major reconstruction and wiring went on, the radio system was not down for long periods of time. OWWR Station Manager Joseph Manfredi and his contractor did all the reconstruction. While Manfredi was teaching summer classes, he worked on the wiring.

According to Manfredi, although students were trained for the analog system, it was a smooth transition for them, since it only involved minor changes. Beaute states that it is a lot easier for people to use, especially for the new-comers on staff. "The best improvement is that it is a lot easier on the eyes to measure the volume on the microphone. Before, you had to measure the volume on a VU meter, so it was hard to see if you were too loud or not. Now, it's a lot easier when you see a red light flashing at you too signal you're being too loud," said Beaute. He added that it makes it a lot easier for overnight broadcasting, "what was a four

to five step process, now takes two steps."

Manfredi's enthusiasm is reflected by the students when they are on the radio and when they use the new equipment. "My goal is for students to be able to be at a level where they can now compete," said Manfredi. Senior Kaishla Figueroa, a member of OWWR agreed, "It's an opportunity for student DJ's and on air personalities to meet industry standards, further establishing the credibility of our student media."

For acceptance into the Jr. Moxxie program on campus, there is an application and selection process done each Spring. Those who are selected then receive subsidized memberships to the program. The minimum requirements are a 2.5 cumulative GPA, enrollment in the College for the subsequent academic year, and having shown potential in being a strong leader and looking for experience or opportunities that will allow them to grow.

HUMVEE ACQUIRED BY UNIVERSITY POLICE

Schools across the country are following a new trend: acquiring military vehicles for their police fleets—and our campus seems to be following the trend. According to *The Washington Post*, this is largely due to a Defense Department program credited with helping to militarize local police departments that also transferred hundreds of pieces of equipment and weapons to school, colleges and university police. Nearly two dozen law enforcement agencies from more than 30 states were affiliated with schools, with about 100 of them university or college affiliated.

The 1033 program, as it is commonly referred to, redistributes unneeded military equipment including vehicles, weapons, and body armor to local police forces. Some of these include public schools in San Diego, Los Angeles and Pinellas County in Florida. Since its inception, the Humvee has become a staple of military operations, both global and domestic. Development of these high mobility multi-purpose wheeled vehicles began with design testing in 1982 under a government program called xm998. The "winning" design resulted in a \$1.2 billion contract in 1983 for the production and delivery of 55,000 vehicles. As with any new technology, these had to be improved before they met the standards the military was hoping to achieve. They were first used in the field in 1989 during the US invasion of Panama.

Old Westbury's Humvee was used by the U.S. Military in Desert Storm. University Police acquired the vehicle with "little to no cost," according to Deputy Chief of Police Steve Siena. Before the vehicle could be used at the university, repairs, paint, and security features were made and paid for, although specific numbers were not available at press time. Some equipment was repurposed from existing inventory. Since its restoration, minor repairs were made to radio equipment.

The Humvee was first used on our campus during the aftermath of super storm Sandy. The Humvee's off-road capabilities proved useful in navigating through massive snow accumulation that is all too frequent during the winter months. In an interview last fall, Siena said only a "select few" were trained in its use. To date, just three member of UPD are trained in its use, with an additional officer tentatively scheduled to receive training in the near future.

UPD has in place emergency plans, along with a protocol for each issue that may occur: an active shooter or natural disaster but none specifically call for the

use of the military vehicle. UPD says it's just another resource to aid in the completion of its mission.

"You can do almost anything better." Siena said in the same interview, in reference to the existing emergency plans. This includes making sure personnel are on hand when needed and acquiring more 4-wheel drive vehicles.

However, with such an ominous presence on campus what message is Old Westbury's Humvee sending? Numerous organizations and institutions have already spoken out against the militarization of police and the potential for dan-

gerous consequences for civilians. An American Civil Liberties Union report released in June stated, "Neighborhoods are not war zones, and our police officers should not be treating us like wartime enemies."

"I don't think anyone who gets to know the members of UPD and our dedication to the safety of the campus would be put off by the sight of a vehicle formerly used by the military." Siena said when questioned about the message this type of equipment sends.

FAST-FOOD WORKERS FIGHT BACK

The fast-food wage strike has become a highly debatable topic. One of the largest recent strikes occurred on September 4th and included hundreds of people from all different cities across the country. Workers from McDonalds, Wendy's, Domino's Pizza, KFC, and more started sit-ins and marches just outside these same restaurants. The overall goal was clear and that was to create enough noise, like getting themselves arrested, as they would receive media attention.

These employees want to increase the worker's wage to \$15 an hour. According to the United States Department of Labor, the minimum wage has been \$8 since December 2013, meaning

the fast-food employees want to almost double their wage. Another part to this puzzle is that these employees want to unionize and they believe that this is the best way to do it without getting punished or ridiculed by employers.

One of the biggest fast-food chains in the country, McDonalds, has come out with a statement that tried to explain the bigger picture when it comes to this problem. They said its franchise operators, "support paying our valued employees fair wages aligned with a competitive marketplace." They also said, "We believe that any minimum-wage increase should be implemented over time so that the impact on owners of small and medium-sized businesses—like the ones who own and operate the majority of our restaurants— is manageable."

Steve West, a restaurant industry analyst for ITG, said that customers would end up paying more for their food to offset the burden of paying these employees their increased wages. This is the ending scenario if an approval for the wage increase did happen. Andrew Puzder, CEO of CKE Restaurants, agrees with West and also said that it will only be a matter of time before customers stop buying their food and eventually that will lead to less positions and maybe even stores having to close. McDonalds stated that about 90% of their restaurants are

independently owned. These store owners in turn give their own personal wages.

President Barack Obama made it known that he wanted to help push the overall wage up to about \$10. In his State of the Union address he made it clear that pushing the wages up was a very important goal before 2015. Something else that is very important to how much the government is getting involved is that bills are being pushed through. President Obama is willing to help push for passage of a bill sponsored by Senator Harkin of

Iowa and Representative Miller of California that would raise the federal minimum wage to \$10.10 and index it to inflation. Our Congress last increased the minimum wage seven years ago. This would be a huge stepping-stone in the process of helping move along the small discussions and problems that have risen since this became a movement. The government and head of the companies understand and see what is wanted from the strikers. Time will only tell if an agreement will come to light.

There is no Double Standard in Domestic Violence: It's a Lot Worse When a Man Hits a Woman

The domestic violence debate is one that branches off into different categories. In one of those categories lies the question of whether we have a double standard in our culture. Is it fair that when a woman is the aggressor against a man that we as a society aren't as outraged as when a man puts his hands on a woman?

I say yeah. It's pretty fair. It's not even a debate. We should absolutely be way more pissed when it's a guy attacking a girl.

What I'm talking about isn't a widespread debate but if you look under enough Ray Rice article comments, or do a search of "female double standards" on Facebook and Twitter, there are more people than you think out there who believe this is an issue that should be given equal outrage. These people will even claim that it isn't just that women physically abusing men receive no news coverage.

Dear Too Trusting,

Before you decide whether or not to break up with your boyfriend after he cheated, it is important to take some time to really think this through instead of making a hasty decision out of anger. However, you do not want to take too much time and prolong a difficult situation. You need to ask yourself whether you should forgive him or forget him. Some would say, "Once a cheater, always a cheater". There is no scientific evidence to validate



this assumption, which it is. There is no surefire way to tell whether he will cheat again. However, his cheating may be a symptom of underlying issues within himself and/or the relationship. These issues needs to be dealt with or they may continue to manifest in destructive ways that will impact your relationship. Regardless of why he cheated, how you feel about him and the relationship is important in making this decision. If you decide to stay with your boyfriend, then it is important to communicate and let him know how you feel. Holding in your anger and feelings of betrayal will only make a difficult situation worse. He too needs to be willing to communicate and work on rebuilding the trust that he broke. This is going to take some time, hard work and patience on both of your parts. You also need to ask yourself whether you think you will be able to forgive him and move forward together in the relationship. 



Spotlight on the Students: Paul Thivierge

Defamed comedian Michael Richards can take a lesson from Paul Thivierge when it comes to handling hecklers. The up-and-coming Levittown bred radio host and stand-up comic doesn't let a rowdy audience member trip him up or send him into a blind (or socially tone deaf) rage. As a matter of fact he welcomes the hecklers—thrives on them even—and it's that rapidity that separates someone who can solely relay jokes on stage and someone with true comedic ability.

So, how does a self-described insecure kid from Long Island hone in on his talent and find his voice amongst the competition? Apparently, a plethora of nervous energy and a steady supply of tabloids.

It's 2011 in the radio station of York

College, a private university located in the central Pennsylvania suburb of Spring Garden Township, and Paul Thivierge is nervous, unsure and about ten seconds from being live on the air for his first radio show. "When I listen to the first show compared to some of the later ones," he says. The media major laughingly recollects, "It's so different, I remember I kept repeating this one word over and over again." However, after working out some initial mic-fright and ensuring his vernacular differentiated, his edgy sense of humor shone through. Late Night with Heavy Paul quickly became one of York College's most popular radio shows with a formula unique from its contemporaries. "It was a live show where we talked seriously about sports and in-between I'd always have these, what are they called? Tabloids, I guess and I'd report some of the celebrity gossip as real news and it

would just go from there." It's easy to become enthralled in the comedy of Paul's show as he explains his satirical spin on American culture's obsession with the lives of celebrities.

Although it was the popularity of Late Night with Heavy Paul that led to Thivierge perusing his stand-up career more seriously, it was his humility paired with raw talent that solidified his success. "I've always been very doubtful, so doing stand-up was easy for me. I already expected people to not like (my act) so I had low expectations." These minute expectations allowed Paul to be vigilant of every variable of a night on stage: the type of crowd (late, early, tipsy, stone cold sober), the types of jokes they are responsive to verses the ones that are panning, and of course, the hecklers. "I love that!" Paul's eyes light up when explaining his specialty of dealing with hecklers and

how he appreciates the fact that dealing with them keeps him on his toes. It's the same light that exudes when he speaks of his love for making people laugh "When someone comes up to you and tells you that you made them laugh, that's the best feeling."

There's a genuine unpretentiousness in Paul Thivierge that seems to be an endangered characteristic as of late, especially in a time of the smug, elitist comic (we're talking to you, Aziz Ansari). The college junior leaves off with his plans for the future; most immediate is finishing his degree at Old Westbury and eventually another stint doing sports/comedy radio. In keeping with his lowered expectations he knows stand-up may not be forever: "When I'm not having fun anymore, it's time for me to stop."

The SUNY College at Old Westbury women's soccer team were unable to hang onto a 3-0 lead at halftime and fell 4-3 to the Sage Gators in Saturday's Skyline Conference action from Albany College of Pharmacy Athletic Fields in Albany, New York. The loss moved Old Westbury (5-5-1) to 0-3 in conference action while Sage (5-3-2) improved to 2-1.

Stephanie Maybie put Old Westbury up early with an unassisted goal at 15:55 for a 1-0 Panther lead. Melissa Outsen then found Mayra Bonilla for her third goal of the season to double Old Westbury's advantage at 37:24 with a 2-0 lead. Maybie wound net her conference-leading 18th goal of the season at 38:09 to send Old Westbury into the half with a

three-goal advantage off Jordan Schildt's team-leading fifth assist of the season. Despite trailing by three goals at the break, Sage held the advantage in shots (8-7) and corner kicks.

Sage's Savannah Mason got the home team on the board at 46:44, putting home Alexandra Robert's corner kick to make it a two-goal game. Mason then struck again when Nicole Maher found her at 53:37 to slice the deficit to one goal. Then at 67:52, Taylor Lynch slotted a pass to Mason to register the hat trick while knotting the game at 3-3. Mason's then capped her four-goal performance at 70:44 to put home Shelby Ruppenthal's assist for the game-winner, putting Sage ahead 4-3.

Sage outshot Old Westbury 8-5 in the final 45 minutes to hold a 16-12 edge in shots for the game and 7-5 advantage in



corner kicks. In the end, Old Westbury put 10 shots on goal, compared to Sage's nine

Caitlin Thomas (4-5-1) made five

saves in defeat for Old Westbury while Teagan Waddingham (5-3-2) stopped seven shots in net for Sage.

tesserrato and Kelly Estacuy each served up three of the Golden Eagles' 16 aces.


