UP WILL ENFORCE ARRESTS FOR MARIJUANA

Chief of Police Steven Siena is now having SUNY Old Westbury university police arrest students on campus if an officer finds someone smoking marijuana. "I told my staff that I expect an arrest to be made," Chief Siena said.

Although not documented anywhere in the Code of Student Conduct, Chief Siena made it aware to incoming students at freshman and transfer orientation and resident assistants during their training that students will be arrested if caught with marijuana. While not a new policy, Chief Siena is now making sure that everyone knows that UP will be making arrests for marijuana.

According to the Code of Student Conduct section 4.B.7 states that "Drugs. Possession of, sale of, consumption, distribution of, being under the influence of, or knowingly being in the presence of narcotics or other controlled substances is prohibited except as expressly permitted by law."

Section 7 states "Sanctions are considered to be both educational and constructive although it [sic] does not preclude punitive action."

"I didn't feel filing just a student misconduct was a sufficient deterrent to our community," stated Chief Siena. "When I first arrived on this campus, three and a half or four years ago, our policy of dealing with marijuana was to write a student misconduct, and like other laws of the State of New York continue to apply them to the Old Westbury campus. I feel like we were wasting an incredible amount of time on calls dealing with [marijuana]."

Chief Siena continued to state that as he was transforming the leadership of UP he was taking the "binds off the police department" and if officers wanted to make an arrest and lawfully (Cont. on page 3.)



One of the most important resolutions that the SUNY Student Assembly (SA) made was "Ban the Box." This resolution meant that students who applied to SUNY schools were not longer asked, "Have you been convicted of a felony?"

According to a 2010 study by the Center for Community Alternatives, a non-profit group in New York, cited by the New York Times, more than 60% of SUNY applicants who stated that they were convicted of a felony, did not end up completing their applications.

Rufrano offered resolution in which professors must place the prices of their required material on the syllabus, that way students are able to see the price of the material before they even register for the course, to see if they could afford it. It was passed with a unanimous vote.

Another resolution that was passed was the reassurance in making sure SUNY tuition does not increase. "For me it was reservation on the actual impact, I looked over the tuition resolution, but I questioned how realistic is this?" said Adelson.

"The new email system is terrible. I hate everything that Outlook has produced." -- Jake Newhoff, a student.

"It's okay; I liked the old [system] better. It was easier to use." – Anastasia, a student (did not want her last name used).

"I didn't mind the regular Gmail, honestly. Gmail was convenient. I didn't have to go searching around for anything."-- Ron, a student (did not want his last name used).

"I don't mind it much but it takes time [to get used to]." -- Brenda Silverman,a student.

"Overall I'd say it's pretty convenient as far as using word documents, PowerPoint, etc. However, I find the layout not as 'user friendly' as Google." --Jabari Curry, a student.

"Initially I didn't think it was such a big deal because I was familiar with Outlook. I actually assumed that it would be better for the students because though Gmail is easier, Microsoft Outlook has more of the programs that students use for their work such as Microsoft Word and PowerPoint. So I thought it would be better for students to use OneDrive. For me as a faculty member it's a mess! Sometimes I don't even see emails that I've got. I don't know why, there's a section for clutter which I guess is Spam, but there's also a Spam folder! I had to deactivate that because I had stuff in my clutter from my director. That's important stuff!"-- Emma Antobam-Ntekudzi, Assistant Librarian.

"I found transitioning from Gmail to the new Outlook to be a very frustrating. I will say that it's gotten easier since I've gotten used to it, but the Google system was very intuitive. I was able to make groups, labels, filters, custom flags so that I could mark emails and different levels of coherency. I found that you can do the same things on Outlook but it's not as easy and obvious. I found that it's been very difficult to search for messages and to keep organized. Overall, I feel like we went from a system that was fluid and smooth and that was set up in a certain way that made my job much easier to a system that's frustrating, freezes and doesn't work sometimes. It also feels unsecure to me because it takes a long time to sign out! If the signing out fails, than it didn't actually sign you out and you have to go back to the page. If you're somewhere and you need to leave to go to another class, and you think you had signed out, it doesn't effectively go through the process, you're still signed in and anyone can go through your e-mail." Anonymous faculty member.

"It's a little inconvenient because before, I could just go to Gmail and sign in, now it's a whole process of going to the Old Westbury site. Asides from that, it's fine I don't have a problem with it." Nigel Shelby, a student.

"I always have trouble logging in on my phone and I don't think it's as user friendly as the old system. I didn't have issues with logging into Gmail on my mobile device and I was used to the layout." Deirdre Bardolf, a student.

"I really liked Gmail because it was so easy to make Word Documents that are saved automatically when we switched the first couple days I was confused as to how to work it but once you learn how to get around it it's really the same thing as Gmail but with better spelling corrections." Julia Sorto, a student.

tion, and I still...help out with the interlibrary loan department."

Other day-to-day issues include dealing with developing new policies to accommodate the changes in the library and making sure they consider students' needs.

"There are many positive changes happening," she said

In regards to the recently finished (and ongoing) renovations in the library, she feels that the money that went into it was put to good use. According to the library's statistics, students are taking advantage of the resources provided. Ms. Di Gregorio added that the goal of the library staff is to ensure that the students are successful and that students and staff have the resources they need. She still believes there is a need to have more space to study.

After receiving her Bachelor of Arts degree in interdisciplinary studies at Hofstra University in 1998, Ms. Di Gregorio went on to work at the Hofstra library as a clerk and later earned a degree in library science from Pratt Institute in 2004. Having worked in a library as an undergrad, she considered herself fortunate enough to have obtained a full-time job in a library due to the rapport she already had with the people there.

"I worked with wonderful people at Hofstra," she said. "It was a great experience and I enjoyed the field – I do enjoy the field."

In 2008, Ms. Di Gregorio joined the SUNY Old West-

bury library. When she started, she worked with access services; she ran the circulation department, reserves, media services, and interlibrary loan, and had quite a few people she supervised. As technology progressed, media wasn't in as high of a demand, so that department dispersed.

"I had an option to either stick with access services, which would just be circulation and reserve, or interlibrary loan," she said. "I chose interlibrary loan to develop the area more."

In response to how her previous and current positions differ, Ms. Di Gregorio stated that one of the main differences is the workload.

"You don't really have the luxury of just sitting," she explained. "Even if you're just sitting, you're working. As a professional, it's good experience: it's interesting to see different aspects of how the library works."

Through the years she has worked in libraries, technology has changed dramatically which also changed the ways in which libraries operate.

Ms. Di Gregorio was granted tenure last year and is currently working towards her Ph.D. in education, with a focus on e-learning technologies, which she should receive by 2017.

"I like my field and what I'm focusing on in my Ph.D. is how technology has changed the field of librarianship, especially the e-learning environment and how that has changed the structure of what we do," she said.

can, they should.

Custodial arrests will be made to students if caught smoking, meaning that students will be detained and reported to the Campus Student Conduct officer. However, there will be no permanent record of the arrest. Criminal arrests will be made for unlawful possession of marijuana and/or intent to sell. According to the New York State Laws and Penalties, more than 2 ounces of marijuana, would be a

criminal amount.

Chief Siena stated that what is done outside of the 604-acres no longer is under UP jurisdiction. However, students who prefer to remain anonymous stated that they are questioned when they smoke off campus.

According to Chief Siena there have been arrests made for marijuana cases, however exact numbers were unable to be provided at this time.

Old Westbury student Yonathan Rodriguez said, "I miss the frappes at the Atrium, I usually spent my den points on them because it's one of the best drinks we have on campus. I cannot wait until the Atrium opens again." Moreover, one of the baristas who worked at the Atrium prior to its renovation is currently working at Dunkin' Donuts and desperately wants to return to her regular position.

The Atrium Cafe is currently looking to hire baristas for 4 p.m. -10 p.m.shifts, Monday through Thursday. Applications can be found in the Chartwells Dining office, located in the basement of the Campus Center.

College has increase in registration

The Fight for Mother Nature

The Dakota Access Pipeline Project is a new approximate 1,172-mile, 30-inch diameter pipeline that will connect the Bakken and Three Forks production areas in North Dakota to Patoka, Illinois. According to an article on the pipeline, featured on the *Smithsonian* website, it will transport approximately 470,000 barrels of oil per day. The Standing Rock Sioux is a Native American tribe. They oppose the pipeline's construction near the Sioux reservation; they believe it threatens their public health and welfare, water supply and cultural resources.

In July, they filed a lawsuit against the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers asking for a preliminary order stopping construction of the pipeline. Their concerns are that the pipeline would pass under the Missouri River, which is a half a mile from Tribe's reservation boundary. (smithsonsian.com). A spill would be culturally and economically catastrophic. The pipeline would pass through areas of great cultural significance, such as sacred sites and burials.

The concerns of an oil spill are a true danger; a fear mirrored by authorities. According to the New Yorker, the pipeline was originally supposed to cross the Missouri River near Bismarck, but it was moved over concerns that an oil spill at that location would have wrecked the state capital's drinking water. As a result, the pipeline was shifted to a crossing half a mile from the reservation. They share the very same concern that The Standing Rock Sioux have about the safety of their water supply.

The Standing Rock reservation has turned into a protest camp of over 1,000 people. Over the past few months, there has been a number of face offs between protesters, the police and the oil company. Peaceful protesters have been faced with violence. On September 3rd, protest-

ers were met with private security who responded to protesters with dogs and pepper spray.

According to the Huffington Post, Amy Goodman a journalist for Democracy now was charged for reporting on site. Democracy Now released raw video footage of violent push back from private security hired by Energy Transfer. Protester stopped workers from bulldozing through fields. A Prosecutor issued a warrant of arrest against Amy for criminal trespassing. When she went to answer the charge, the prosecutor dropped trespassing charge because of lack of evidence but proceeded to charging the journalist with participation of a riot.

The Judge on the case dropped all charges. Amy Goodman in an interview with the MSNBC reflects on the judge's decision, "This is a huge vindication of the first amendment and most importantly the public's right to know. In this case about this epic struggle of native Americans and non native allies taking on massive pipeline in the fossil fuel industry dealing with nothing less than the fate of the planet, climate change."

The attack on the Democracy Now journalist is not over. She states that after the judge ruled and rejected the charges for a second time. When flying out of Bismarck she was informed that the state prosecutor, Ladd Erickson, was looking into pressing other charges against Amy. Her response to this was, "They are not stopping, they are attempting to intimidate the press. This goes way beyond me, their message to reporters is: Do not come to North Dakota. This is an epic battle that all the media should be flocking to North Dakota to cover." Intimidation tactics against journalist attempting to expose real events happening within our country is truly undemocratic and an

attack on Americans first amendment rights.

More recently, on October 22, several protesters marched toward the Dakota Access pipeline construction site. According to the Intercept, the marchers never made it to their destination. Instead, they were attacked by police forces that used pepper spray and beat protesters with batons. Dozens of officers, backed by military trucks, police vans, machine guns, and nonlethal weapons, violently approached the group without warning. Protesters were peaceful and non violent.

So should government have the ability to give federal permits to energy companies, in this case. to place oil pipelines, without first consulting the people who might be affected by a potential catastrophe? Or should the public be consulted and possibly even vote on such decisions?

Professor Chipley who has worked as an environmental advocate stated,"They should absolutely be consulted; this is the water that they drink, this is their tribal land, they are intimately connected with this land. So they should absolutely have

a say in the direction of the land and how it's used. Pipelines industrialize people's living spaces and threaten their water supply, this is the main reason people are upset."

Nathalie, a senior at Old Westbury says, "Absolutely! These things affect our environment. I feel like the government needs to start focusing on our health than finding ways to make more money. I personally think pipelines should not be anywhere near people."

The pipeline protests have been ignored my main stream media. This issue should be discussed and be given the attention it deserves. Native Americans are attempting to maintain what little culture they have left, after 100s of years of their land and history being ripped away from them. They are attempting to save this earth, which we all live on, from more industrial damage which would affect us all.

Journalism Professor Karl Grossman, a forty-year veteran of the school, stated, "I wish it did more changing of the community." Grossman believed that although this school did well with having

a diversified population, outside of these gates things are different. As stated by Grossman, this is a personal place where the students and faculty get to know each other and Long Islanders could take Old Westbury as an example because students will never see one group of people isolated or excluded because of race. Everyone works together and we are the community that we should want to see. Grossman stated that the campus has changed but it still kept its core values and culture. As he revisited the vision of the school in our minds, we discovered that although time has passed and things have become different, the school achieved its goals. We have everything we need to be successful. As far as the visions

of the past are being fulfilled it is clear that whatever sparked a vision for this school, it ignited something great in the process.

It is important to know the roots of the campus and know that the school in which you attend was created for students to create change and create diversity in a time in which it was not a societal norm. If you are the great outcome to an experiment of diversifying a student population, then it is important to keep in mind what you and your student body are capable of and spreading it to the community.

She points out that Trump has been "petulant" in complaining about the amount of speaking time he got in the second debate, especially considering Trump clocked in at 40 minutes and ten seconds and Clinton at 39 minutes and five seconds. Boo hoo!

In addition to this, Trump often scoffs at things Hillary says and shrugs them off, not taking her seriously. "That concept was the core of my tweet that went viral: Women simply don't have the luxury of letting loose in public settings, because we'll be judged as crazy, overreacting, or bitchy- and we'll be penalized for it," Every stated.

Even at her calmest and most poised, Hillary is criticized for not being warm and maternal and living up to other societal stereotypes of women. Professor Laura Chipley of SUNY Old Westbury attributes this in part to Trump's efforts to put others, often minorities, "in their place." Just as he tried to exclude President Obama with his "birther" conspiracies, Trump attempts to depreciate women by putting emphasis on their "aesthetic, sexual, and maternal roles," Chipley notes.

As far as the mass media pinning a "likeability and sincerity problem" on Clinton, Professor Chipley blames the "patriarchal lens" that our society uses to evaluate leadership. Again, women are not praised for being authoritative and "unapologetic."

And then there are those "aesthetic" components to which many criticize Hillary on. As Genesis says, "it matters what she's saying, not what she's wearing." Professor Vicki Metz brings up the constant discussion about what she's wearing, the pantsuits, and the jewelry, or lack thereof, that she is wearing. "She is under the microscope more, but why should any of that matter," Metz asks.

Metz expresses frustration in that neither of the candidates have been granted ample time to talk about the real issues. She is more concerned with war-torn countries, the rate of unemployment, issues of race and veterans. "I could list ten things I'd like to see addressed and instead they're wasting time," she says.

During the third and final debate, issues of immigration, healthcare, and the Supreme Court did finally arise. While

Trump insists on repealing the Affordable Care Act, Clinton promises to reform it and keep what works. As students, this is extremely relevant because she plans on keeping "what works" of Obamacare, such as children under 26 years old remaining on their parent's insurance.

She also has spoken of plans to provide free state college tuition, which many experts, economists, and college officials dispute. They claim that delivering billions of additional taxpayers money to schools does not ensure that it will be spent wisely and can sometimes lead to tuition increases.

These issues continue to have a shadow cast upon them in the wake of "locker room talk" tapes being released and more women stepping forward with sexual assault allegations against Trump, as he attempts bitterly to cover up, saying that they are all liars and "will be sued."

As Election Day quickly approaches, more information about Clinton's emails have also resurfaced. Is Consent Really B.A.E.?

It's an undeniable fact that rape culture has truly been brought to the eye of mainstream media in 2016. Whether it be unbelievable remarks from presidential candidate Donald Trump or rape cases like NBA basketball star Derrick Rose the rise of rape culture has become inevitable.

Feminist in the 1970s brought about the term "rape culture" to explain the way society approaches and normalizes exploitation and sexual aggression towards women.

Why is it that "don't get raped" is taught more often instead of "don't rape?" Why is it that someone running for president of the United States has made comments regarding women such as "grab her by the p****?" 2011 NBA MVP Derrick Rose has

These statements at hand demonstrate the lack of understanding of what consent is.

Doe claimed she wasn't looking for fame and she just wanted the men to take accountability. The mere fact that there is no proof was enough to dismiss the fact consent was never given as even Rose admitted.

Therefore, on October 19th Rose walked away a free man with his endorsements and contract still in place. Although no one but the four participants know what occurred that night, both sides admitted there was no consent. This case does show the patriarchal way of thinking we are being imposed. Cases like this continue to instill fear to victims who feel their truth will be casted away because their word is simply not enough and provide rapist with comfortability to continue.

The misunderstanding of what consent is has truly made an impact on society even after the verdict. Campus organizations such as Active Minds use their platform to educate students on what consent is and ways to prevent a mentality that supports rape culture. Terms like "Consent is B.A.E. (Before Anything Else)" are being promoted on college campuses where rape culture seems to be misunderstood more than anywhere else.


Childish Gambino's series *Atlanta* is another show that has been rearranging the





Panthers Men's Soccer Concludes Season with Postseason Berth

SUNY Old Westbury men's soccer lost a 4-3 Skyline Conference Championship shootout in Saturday's 1-1 first-round final to the visiting No. 6 The Sage Colleges Gators (7-7-4) inside Panther Park. Old Westbury concludes the season with a record of 11-4-5 after advancing to the postseason for the first time since 2011.

Defense was the theme of the opening half as both teams were unable to find the back of the net. Fabrizio Chamorro fired wide 8:05 in for Old Westbury's first attempt while Paul Reynoso's blocked

shot put Sage in the shot column at 10:53. Both teams put up four shots apiece through 45 minutes of play.

After a defensive oriented first half, it was the offense's time to shine early on in the second period. Ryan Fairweather found River Seybolt 2:44 in to break the scoring ice for Sage with his 15th goal of the season. Old Westbury answered quickly with James Marchena setting Dominick Guidice (14th goal of the season) up 42 seconds later for the equalizer to send a 1-1 game into overtime. With his 10th helper of the season,

Marchena became the first Panther to register double-digit assists since 2009, when Fabian Santibanez, a two-time Skyline Conference Player of the Year selection, totaled 13.

Old Westbury dominated offensive possession in the first overtime period while Sage played the aggressor in the second as the score remained tied heading into the shootout to decide the winner.

Oscar Sosa put the Panthers up, 1-0, in the shootout before Derlis Zayas tied the tally three shooters later for Sage. Eric

Ragogna and Chris Agbodoh also put away goals prior to a set of Panther misses. Sage converted on its final-four attempts as Christian Pinti's goal advanced the Gators into Wednesday's (Nov. 2) semifinal at No. 2 Mount Saint Mary College.

In the end, Sage held the advantage in shots (14-12), shots on goal (6-2) and corner kicks (7-6).

Mike Warren (10-4-5) made four saves in between the Panthers' pipes as Mike Chiaravalloti (4-2-1) stopped one shot for Sage.

Panthers Cross Country Wraps up Season at Skyline Conference Championships

SUNY Old Westbury men's and women's cross country concluded the 2016 season at the Skyline Conference Championships on Sunday afternoon at the Broadway Avenue Park course in Sayville, New York.

Sara Bey ran the 6K course in 28:20.60 to finish 39th in the race to lead the Panthers to 11th place place with 304 points in the 12- team event. Brianna Stamm was Old Westbury's second finisher in 29:39.26 to claim 55th place. Habiba Nofal clocked a 68th place finish in 31:01.71while Jennifer Lobody followed in 97th with a time of 37:17.99. Harseerat Kohli rounded out Old Westbury's top-five scorers in 102nd place (42:50.99). Shakima Washington (103rd, 49:23.11) and Jennifer Siemann (104th, 49:57.15) also competed in Old Westbury's final race.

Erin MacDonell of St. Joseph's College (L.I.) claimed the individual title in 24:19.73 while Farmingdale State Col-

lege scored 51 points to claim the team title.

On the men's side, Richard Forkuo was the first Panther to cross the 8K finish line in 32:46.24 for a 55th place finish as Old Westbury claimed 10th place with 283 points. Joseph Cueter followed in 75th place in 36:54.96, while Jose Roman (39:38.77), Kwasi Asare (40:02.57) and Jonah Wegener (40:20.77) finished 80-81-82 to complete Old Westbury's scoring. Ricardo Carreto-Sagona (85th, 41:05.52), Divine Nisbeth (87th, 43:06.24), Uche Iregbu (88th, 43:59.43) and Jimmy Jose (91st, 47:54.16) rounded out the racers for the Panthers.

Connor Cole finished in 27:16.14 to earn the individual title in leading United States Merchant Marine Academy to the team championship with 39 points.
