"All audio-visual equipment in the college classrooms not just the NAB or the library is in working order and functioning," according to Evan Kobolakis, assistant vice president of information technology services and chief information officer. But staff, faculty, and students disagree.

Professor Lee Blackstone, associate professor of sociology, said, "Not much has improved, that I can tell, from my last interview. I still experience problems getting the video projector in my room to 'respond' to the main console on occasion, so I've had to work around that (i.e., finding a DVD video I was going to show) or on YouTube instead and praying that the streaming speed won't be too slow."

A professor in the American Studies/Media and Communications Department, who wished to remain anonymous, twice had to move classrooms this semester, disrupting students, because the audio/visual equipment didn't work. Such equipment is still broken in some NAB classrooms.

Laura Chipley, assistant professor of media and communications and co-director of the Media Innovation Center, said that she has to bring her own adapter to the library to plug into the school issued computer via HDMI.

The malfunctioning of newly-installed printers -which department secretaries, in particular, say are not necessary and are difficult to use -- persists with one SUNY OW employee recalling a recent incident in which a professor trying to print received only blurred pages. This printer is one of sixty-two multifunction printing devices on campus which, according to Kobolakis, "Reduce the cost of printing and copying and offer added functionality [such as] printing, copying and scanning." These devices were purchased for \$168,000 under a five-year (Cont. on page 3.)

How Internships Add to a Student's Experience and Future Employment

Every semester SUNY Old Westbury media and communications students gain valuable work experience through internships.

They learn new and appropriate skills and gain knowledge, preparing them for jobs. But the reality for many is far away from what they were expecting, as for many students finding a job after graduating is not easy. That is why SUNY OW students need to consider doing internships as career investments that can help them explore employment opportunities after graduation.

Employers and organizations across the country offer internships to provide students with career-based learning experiences that involve a real work environment and workplace expectations. According to the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U), seventy-three percent of employers encourage colleges to emphasize the ability to apply knowledge and skills to real-world settings through internships.

"Internships provide an opportunity for a student to learn about the area of their interest from the inside," said American Studies/Media and Communications Professor Karl Grossman, who began and supervised internships in journalism at SUNY Old Westbury forty-years ago. Since he initiated the internship program, more (Cont. on page 3.)

Micro-Credentials Arrive at SUNY OW

Micro-credentials are now available at SUNY Old Westbury and are available for non-degree students.

Micro-credential are a digital form of certification that indicates competency in a specific skill or set of skills, according to the National Education Association (NEA). To earn micro-credentials, educators identify competencies they want mastered and students complete the requirements to earn them. "Because micro-credentialing is a relatively new model of professional learning, there is very little existing contract language or policy documentation codifying implementation," the NEA notes.

A micro-credential certifies that a student has attained a specified competency or skill set, generally by completing a group of two to four related courses with a grade of B or better. Once the requirements of a micro-credential are completed, a student is issued a digital icon that can be embedded in social media or an electronic résumé. Stony Brook University and the University of Buffalo are among the universities that are already using micro-credentials.

Director of the School of Professional Studies Edward Bever, who is directing the micro-credential program, said, "We're just starting our first set and the School of Business has two in its graduate accounting program in taxation. So they can have people come in and take two or three classes with them and get a micro-credential for that and then the person might decide to go on and get the full masters degree here or they may just come and take the couple of classes."

The School of Business is offering a business taxation micro-credential and an estate, gift & trust taxation micro-credential on the graduate level, and on the undergraduate level the Department of Psychology is offering the micro-credential in foundational **(Cont. on page 3.)**

contract that covers toner, support and maintenance, Kobolakis said.

This amount could have replaced AV equipment in at least ten classrooms at a cost of between \$12,000 to \$15,000 each.

Furthermore, maverick drones were purchased, according to a source, but are not being used, and the use of the virtual reality lab installed in Room 106 of the NAB about three months ago is unclear.

Kobolakis says that the school needs to replace its networking before

much of the equipment can be replaced. A source close to the IT department warned that if there were a network breakdown the school's technology would be crippled for many days due in part to a lack of trained personnel.

The main duties of a network administrator include being responsible for analysis, design, implementation, maintenance and support of SUNY OW's infrastructure. But the senior system administrator left earlier this year. Then the person who followed as the network administrator left in October and his responsibilities fell on the remaining staff.

Employees are reportedly dissatisfied with the ITS management style. A source, who has since resigned, complained that the management lacks communication and has a demeaning approach to the staff.

But Kobolakis states that the departure of employees is due a high turnaround in IT positions caused by highly competitive labor markets with a high demand for IT services. "[SUNY OW] cannot compete compensation wise, with financial services firms, hospitals, or private colleges," he said. "While our budget has increased and positions were added, the salary gap still remains deep and wide."

than 3,500 journalism students have participated.This semester thirty-one students are taking part.

"At the start of every semester, I devote a good part of my first or second classes in the courses I teach in journalism to detailing what our internship in journalism program is about and answering questions," he said.

Professor Grossman encourages his students to do more than one internship, and he also helps to find a place for them. "There is an enormous number of media outlets on Long Island," he said. "I suggest media and communications students take both a 'small' internship on Long Island and a 'big' internship in the city...an internship also allows students to network.....which can be very helpful in entering the field."

According to the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE), employers reported that about forty-four percent of their class of 2009 hires came from their own internship programs. In addition, the study also found that 42.3 percent of the seniors who had internship experience and applied for a job received at least one job offer. When OW college students perform well as an intern, employers or organizations may offer them a permanent role after graduating, or at least offer a good reference to help them job hunt.

There are many success stories. To name only a few: After serving an internship at MSNBC's *AM Joy*, Arlyn Sorto became a graphics production assistant for the show.

Selena Hill is digital editor at *Black Enterprise* magazine.

Larry Lawson had an internship at WCBS-TV in New York. He did well and then, as Professor Grossman remembered, he called Professor Grossman and told of being offered a job-but working in the mail room at CBS. "He spoke of not wanting this, of seeking to be a producer," Professor Grossman recalled. "I advised him to take the job as a 'foot in the door.' He said that even though but a mail clerk, he was noticed-and taken under the wings of 60 Minutes' Ed Bradley and Andy Rooney. And in short order, this young man 'from the projects in Brooklyn,' he noted, became a producer at CBS, then moving on to CNN, Black Entertainment Television and ESPN, and is now news and coordinating producer at the New England Sports Network."

Molly O'Callaghan, a media and communications major, said that she learned about an internship program through her OW advisor, who told her that she needed a number of internship credits in order to graduate.

O'Callaghan did a four credit internship this previous summer at Fishbat Media, a digital marketing agency in Patchogue. After completing her internship, she was hired for a part time position and plans to transition to a full-time position upon graduation this December. "[An] internship is

a really important thing to do," she said. "Because it creates the opportunity to have relationships wherever you are interning and can possibly help open up the door for employment there."

Not all SUNY OW students are aware of the importance of taking advantage of internship programs offered by the college, and some graduates wished they had known about interning and had done an internship. "I have a degree in criminology, but I work a part time job as an assistant at a daycare center," said former SUNY Old Westbury student, Deanna Parasco. "I feel disappointed." Parasco received her degree in criminology in 2018 and is a first-generation college student. She had hopes of becoming a detective; however, after graduating, she did not know how or where to apply for jobs associated with her major.

Doing an internship probably would have provided Parasco with some knowledge about her field of study. "When I was in college, I really focused on passing my classes and completing my work," Ms. Parasco said. "I only spoke to my advisors and they never told me what I should do besides choosing my classes."

Dr. Denise Cummins, a research psychologist, emphasizes the importance of a student's involvement in a workplace. "In order to be prepared for the workplace, students need to spend more time exploring work environments," Cummins said. "The lecture and exam format that dominates academia may be the gold standard for knowledge acquisition, but it renders students ill prepared to make use of that knowledge in a dynamic workplace."

Internships play a vital role in helping students figure out their career plans, which means students need to look around and find what works for them. Professor Grossman said his Antioch College internship at the *Cleveland Press* in Ohio had inspired him to become an investigative reporter. The newspaper had a motto: "Give light and the people will find their own way."

He added: "I was impressed by the investigative reporters at the newspaper documenting instances of corruption, danger, abuse and other social injustices, and then seeing a resolution -- half the time -- because of what was published, caused me to want to become an investigative reporter, which I became."

Professor Grossman said, "Whether it's media and communications or accounting or any other field through applied or experiential education, OW students will gain in an internship a great way to learn more about her or his major."

counseling skills.

SUNY Old Westbury Honored with Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award

For the second year in a row, SUNY Old Westbury has been honored with the Higher Education Excellence in Diversity (HEED) Award from *INSIGHT Into Diversity* magazine. According to the publication, this award "measures an institution's level of achievement and intensity of commitment in regard to broadening diversity and inclusion on campus through initiatives, programs, and outreach; student recruitment, retention, and completion; and hiring practices for faculty and staff."

SUNY OW is one of only eight schools in the State of New York to receive this award, along with only ninety-three others across the US. On the topic of the school winning the award, President Calvin O. Butts III said, "As it has been since our founding more than 50 years ago, SUNY Old Westbury's mission continues to include cultivating an inclusive campus environment that fosters diversity in culture, thought, and deed." Lenore Pearlstein, co-publisher of *INSIGHT Into Diversity* magazine, has been quoted as saying, "We take a detailed approach to reviewing each application in deciding who will be named a HEED Award recipient. The magazine highlights the Interfaith Center on campus (located in the student union room 326), where students of various religious and spiritual backgrounds can meet, as well as offer meditation activities by the counseling and psychological wellness services office. These events include the celebrations of Black History Month, Women's History Month, Hispanic/Latinx Heritage Month, and Native American Heritage Month. The Search for a New President

After Dr. Calvin O. Butts III announced in March his intention to retire as president of SUNY Old Westbury, the school set up a committee to find his successor.

Thomas DelGiudice, associate professor of Politics, Economics and Law at SUNY OW, is a member of the search committee that is currently looking for a replacement. According to DelGiudice, there are six faculty members who were selected after a runoff vote, four members from the college council, and an administrative staff member. "The college council chair is the head of the committee," DelGiudice said.

He added that there has been a delay in the search due to the fact that Professor Mario B. Mignone of Stony Brook University, who was on the college council and the chairman of the presidential search committee, passed away on September 9th. "We are kind of leaderless now," said DelGiudice. "The other thing that came up was that there were also some vacancies on the college council as well. That requires the governor appointing people or at least somebody letting us know what a temporary solution might be for that...so we're kind of sitting on that."

In terms of the progress being made in the search, DelGiudice believes it's a waiting game. "It's a little bit of a mystery," he said. "Evidently, there are a number of college president vacancies so it'll be a number of searches. That's going to require the governor and chancellor to get a little more involved in picking our vacancies on the college council...we're grounded to a halt."

DelGiudice stated that Dr. Butts will be taking a leave of absence in January. "Nobody really has a lot of information," he said. "Dr. Butts has met with the chancellor...and so we're kind of waiting to hear."

Since the amount of information is scarce, DelGiudice thinks that the search may take an extended period of time. "I'm assuming the chancellor filled [President Butts] in," he said. "And I'm assuming there will be an interim president or acting president. I don't know if it'll be an internal or external person. I'm assuming it may go into next year because the search might take longer than a semester."

Is Our Campus Safe?

Earlier this month, University Police released its annual security report displaying information and statistics from 2018. "This has been a safe campus and continues to be a very safe campus," said Police Chief Steven Siena.

According to the report, there were forty nine drug-law violations including nineteen liquor-law violations, three cases of rape (as opposed to none two years ago), and two cases of aggravated assault (up from zero in 2017). However, no fires were reported this past year compared to three in 2017, drug-related arrests went down from eleven in 2017 to five last year, and the number of burglaries decreased from five to two.

When it came to the future of the campus about safety, Siena was optimistic. "The dedicated members of the University Police Department will continue to work diligently to keep Old Westbury among the safest colleges in the SUNY system, and I expect the next annual security report to reflect [the] same."

However, he stressed the importance of obeying laws related to drugs and alcohol on campus, stating, "I would ask our residential students to be more mindful that regardless of age, alcoholic beverages are not permitted on campus."

Siena reminds students, "Regardless of what might be the case in other states, marijuana continues to be unlawful in the State of New York and is not permitted on campus." While some safety concerns that need to be addressed, particularly the issue of having drugs and alcohol on campus, SUNY Old Westbury is still a safe place, according to Siena.

Additionally, the report stresses a zero-tolerance policy against weapons on campus, as it states, "Violators are subject to college discipline as well as criminal sanctions." Students are also urged to keep their "valuables" safe and secure, be aware at all times of their surroundings, and also to report any suspicious or criminal activity they may witness.

Siena takes his role very seriously in maintaining safety on campus. "Every action that we take is with an eye toward preventing crime or solving crime, and to create and maintain an environment that protects and enhances the safety and security of our community," said Siena.

For any emergencies, the officers at the University Police Department strongly urges students to dial 516-876-3333 or extension 3333, or 516-628-5555. For any concerns related to the physical safety of campus buildings and grounds, students are advised to call the Physical Plant office, which is open Mondays through Fridays from 7:00 am to 3:30 pm, and to call the University Police for anything that occurs during the office's non-business hours.

Mold Protest

After complaints of mold in the dorms, a protest led by SGA President Kalief Metellus took place on October 15th outside the Woodlands Residence Halls. Students marched from the courtyards of the Residence Halls to the Campus Center, holding posters and chanting "pay what you owe cause we have mold," in reference to their belief that the college is not doing enough to prevent the outbreak.

A petition was created calling on the administration to do more.

At his fall convocation in September, President Calvin O. Butts III addressed the mold problem: "Let me state clearly that I hear and understand your concerns. I can't stress enough how much we'd like to see this remedied as much as you." He told students and faculty that the school is taking proper measures to make sure that these issues will be avoided in the future as best as they can.

According to Usama Shaikah, vice president of student affairs and chief diversity officer, the administration has maintained procedures against mold that have been in place since the beginning of the academic year. The college invested heavily to reduce the likelihood of mold occurring, including purchasing and installing 15 commercial dehumidifiers -- one for every floor of each building.

The university says that every room has been cleaned and air filters have been replaced, "We ask students to monitor conditions in their rooms, keep their windows closed to defend against humidity, and report immediately any circumstances they feel need to be addressed so that the college's team can address them," Shaikah advised.

Asia Alexandre, president of the Residential Hall Association (RHA), felt that SUNY OW is doing its best to try to prevent it, but it is not happening fast enough the way students expect. Alexandre went on to explain that the RHA is also responsible for implementing policies and procedures for students who encounter any problems in their dorms.

She advised students to report on signs of the mold in their rooms if they see it. "Paper trails are important, she said.

Among the protesters was Danieka Patterson, a junior majoring in criminology who was one of the students affected by the mold. Both Patterson and her roommate threw away their items contaminated with mold.

She said that she was told by other students that she had to file small claims, but the deadline had already passed. Along that process, she was told that she had to provide receipts for her to be reimbursed for the damages.

The SGA is currently in the process of writing a resolution for a request to install dehumidifiers in each room of all the Residence Halls. They have yet to follow up with the resolution for their upcoming General Assembly meeting on December 6th.

Metellus suffered health symptoms from the mold which resulted in being hospitalized twice. In addition, he discovered that his clothes and medical bills added up to \$12,000. As a result, he decided to create a "Go Fund Me" page as a way to raise money.

Metellus shared his feelings moving forward after the protest: "My hope is that SUNY OW can get the proper funding to address this issue, so that no student who attends SUNY OW has to worry about going to hospitals, being sick, losing their belongings, and that they can have a safe and learning environment."

Their presence juxtaposed with the human figure creates a narrative filled with chaos and unsettling experience. "Looking into The Eyes of Death," is a portrait of a woman, experiencing various states of emotion, where the past comes to haunt her present thoughts and waking life, as she looks into the mirror to see her inevitable future, and questions her very existence.


Each year, NYCC outdoes themselves and creates a memorable experience for all in attendance. "Every year there's something new!" Cassano said. "No year has been like the one before it."

Best-selling artist Post Malone played back-to-back at Madison Square Garden (MSG) with his "Runaway Tour" on October 14th and 15th; with openers Tyla Yaweh, Funkmaster Flex and Swae

Malone is an American rapper/ singer who is known for some popular songs such as *White Iverson, Rockstar* (featuring 21 Savage), and *Sunflower* (featuring Swae Lee), just to name a few. According to the music streaming platform Spotify, Malone is the second most streamed artist in the world, with an average of fifty-eight million listeners a month on the service.


The concert started right on time with the first opener Tyla Yaweh. As for most concerts, not a lot of attention was focused on the opener. The crowd wasn't too familiar with his songs and not everyone was in the arena yet; however, I give props to Yaweh for his high energy and for really trying to connect with the audience. He performed nine tracks including High Right Now, Understand Me, They Ain't You. Following Tyla Yaweh performance was a brief intermission controlled by DJ Funkmaster Flex. Flex played multiple mashups of popular hip-hop songs that got the crowd pumped up before Swae Lee took the stage.

American Rapper, Swae Lee, later took the stage playing fourteen songs. Even though Lee performs only his half of featured songs multiple times, his performance felt like a good amount of stage time and he interacted well with the crowd. Swae Lee also brought out rapper Rich the Kid who performed his hit song *Plug Walk* together and performed *No Type* and *Black Beatles* with his brother Slim Jxmmi. The audience's reaction to seeing the duo of Rae Sremmurd was very lively, I assume because Lee has been working more as a solo artist lately. Lee also performed other hits such as *Guatemala, Powerglide,* and *Unforgettable.*

Post Malone entered the stage a couple minutes after Swae Lee a song from his *Hollywood's Bleeding* album. Post Malone's performance throughout was made energetic and fiery by including fireworks and fire, which made the audience go crazy! During some songs, Malone would connect with the fans and talk to the audience before continuing onto the next song. Other songs Malone played off his newest album included *Saint-Tropez, Wow, Goodbyes* and also performs older songs from previous albums including *Candy Paint, I Fall Apart, Better Now, Psycho.*

In total, Malone performed twenty songs, giving his fans a true bang for their buck. The only complaint I have about the concert is although Malone's performance delivered, the stage time felt very fast. Malone ends his last song with his diamond-certified hit single *Congratulations*. Before his last performance for the night, Malone gave a brief speech

In a career that spans over five decades, Stephen King has been terrifying his readers with his writing. He has created some of the most nefarious characters in literature, from the demonic clown of *It* to the psychotic nurse in *Misery*. He has been described by many as the "King of Horror," but to his most loyal readers (his Constant Readers), that name is a gross misconception of King as a writer.

The Institute, his 61st and most recent novel, is further proof of this notion. It's filled with traditional "King" tropes (small town, kids with psychic abilities, shady government), but it's his brilliance as a story-teller that is most apparent.

The novel opens with Tim Jameison, an ex-cop forced to resign because of an off-duty incident, hitchhiking his way up north to New York, impassively taking odd jobs along the way. His wandering eventually leads him to the rural town of DuPray, North Carolina, where he becomes the town's "night knocker", patrolling the streets and alleys for any

life" to evoke a strong sense of nostalgia, warmth, and longing (*Salem's Lot*, *It*, *Needful Things*). He delivers once again as DuPray is home to a diverse group of colorful characters, like Orphan Annie, a homeless, conspiracy theory

zealot, and Norbert Hollister, the old-timer motel manager.

For 75 pages, King makes the reader nice and cozy in DuPray, but then (almost abruptly) takes us to Minnesota, people of Assimilation over the edge, they all open a simulation of a burning torch on their phones and march over to the Addams family's property. The movie makes a point to show that the people that are most against the Addams family are the older people within the "assimilated" town. When Wednesday is finally able to go to junior high, she has less of a problem fitting in and being accepted. She even becomes best friends with Parker (voiced by Elsie Fisher), Margaux's daughter who doesn't get along with her mother or agree with her.

The current trendy animation style of the past few years of super skinny elongated or super wide short bodies actually works in *The Addams Family* because the family resembles their original 1930's comic incarnations. Bringing this timeless family into the modern day and mixing them within our current



political climate makes *The Addams Family* feel familiar, yet fresh as it looks at immigration and family customs in its own way.

where we meet our main protagonist Luke Ellis, twelve-year-old genius with mild telekinetic abilities. He is kidnapped and taken to a remote complex, known simply as "The Institute", where he meets kids around his own age with

> varying telekinetic or telepathic abilities and are continuously tested on by unscrupulous government officials.

The story is fast-paced, emotionally charged, and brilliantly structured. King writes some of his most gut-wrenching

scenes in years (immersion tank), while still being able to sprinkle his sense of humor throughout. The ending (though sluggish at times) really worked for me and provided a moment of catharsis. The Institute is also another candidate for being misconstrued as another scary tale, filed neatly away with King's other books. But what's most impressive with King's writing here (and with his previous works) is his strong grasp of the human psyche. The characters that emerge are rife with complexity, idiosyncrasies, and perhaps the most poignant, naturalism. What makes his stories effective is having these ordinary characters placed in extraordinary circumstances.

As I read, I became deeply sympathetic towards Luke and the alienation he felt in school. I became envious of the poise and control Tim had during tumultuous situations. I wish I lived in a town where after my 9-5 shift, I can stroll into the local bar and the barkeep (who knows my name) has my drink waiting on a coaster. This is what life is all about, and King proves once again, he still gets it.



"Sharp Objects"

Works by Jackie Branson, Pam Brown, Roxi Marsen and Tmima Z **Amelia A. Wallace Gallery Until November 27th**

This exhibition features the work of four contemporary artists; Jackie Branson, Pam Brown, Roxi Marsen, and Tmima Z; and was curated by Pam Brown and Stephen Lamia.

"The one thing that comes to mind immediately is that sharp objects can hurt people-damage people; but they can also be forms of protection," Lamia noted. "So you got this duel edge situation going on."

This concept is explored very candidly, I have to say. The works consist of sculptures and assemblage pieces. As soon as you step into the gallery, you're greeted with the lovely works of Roxi Marsen (who received an M.F.A. from Pratt Institute), including two of my favorite pieces "Lyre Variation" (2019) and "Target Practice" (2018), which is a ring with what appears to be a pair of scissors attached to it with a center target that has the number fifty on it. I was most impressed with Marsen's pieces, as she uses ordinary and mundane "found objects," such as frying pans, eggbeaters, and repurposes them to create intricate and layered works of art.


"We have over fifty pieces in the show," said Brown. "And when [Lamia] and I put the show together, we weren't thinking we would get such a beautiful large space like this."

Beautiful might not be the word many would think of when hearing the term "sharp objects," but these women definitely pull it off. Repurposing these regular practically "trash-like" objects and the ideas associated with them is something of an amazing feat. Brown says that the approach that all four women took was to go scavenging for items and essentially redesign them.

I believe Branson's work definitely reflects that. She grew up in northern New Jersey and has earned a BFA in printmaking and drawing from the University of New Hampshire as well as an MFA from the University of Pennsylvania where she studied printmaking, sculpture and digital media.


In Branson's three-panel piece "Resistance" (2017), she uses industrial saw blades and layers it on a yellow and white patterned carpet. Branson says she was working to alter the traditional way we think of these items. "The themes I am working with is transforming these really masculine materials-sawblades-into a feminine, domestic pattern," said Branson.

For similar reasons, my favorite of

Brown's works includes her "Mandrill" (2003) piece on the second level of the gallery. It is a large spiral sculpture that kind of looks like a delicate flower, but the material it is made out of is rough and almost masculine.

Brown received her B.F.A. from New York State College of Ceramics, Alfred University and her M.F.A. from Mason Gross School of Art, Rutgers University, New Jersey. Her large scale sculptures have been installed in various institutions around the country including Socrates Sculpture Park in Long Island City and the Chesterwood Preservation in Stockbridge, MA.

Tmima Z takes over the lower gallery in

the exhibit, with various sculptures that connect with the Holocaust. She was born in Vilnius, Lithuania and moved to Israel. Her mother was a Holocaust survivor. The piece that stood out the most to me was "Never Again" (2016). It seems to be a collection of pieces from the Holocaust, specifically items that look like it belonged in a child's nursery mixed with gun shells and ammo.

All four women brought something amazing to this exhibit. It is a really creative concept all around, and something that I think people should take advantage of and visit on campus right away.

However, with this being the "official" start of the awards season, October saw the release of many smaller movies that did not go national yet and may have went under the radar. So here's a few of my favorite films released in October that I think are worth checking out, and might even garner some awards buzz.

El Camino: A Breaking Bad Movie (on Netflix)



Talks of re-entering the *Breaking Bad* universe left many fans excited but worried. Would it be worth continuing the story of an arguably flaw-less series that ended satisfy-ingly? Well, apparently yes. Anyone that knows writer/director Vince Gilligan and his work knows that he only likes creating stories worth telling, and wouldn't endanger his previous work with anything subpar. In "El Camino," we

finally get to find out what happened to Jesse Pinkman after the series finale when he escapes from his captors. Anyone looking for a tense, thrilling drama that is well directed, written, and acted should definitely check this one out right away. Of course, this film works best for fans of *Breaking Bad*, but for other people, there is still a great crime thriller to enjoy.

Parasite (In theaters)



Parasite works best when going in knowing as little as possible. For that reason, I will not give a synopsis for this one. I will say, however, at times it is a drama, other times a comedy, and then at some point it transforms into a thriller; all while keeping a thematic focus on wealth disparity and how social class divisions are just a fallacy. This is a masterclass in storytelling, in terms of how the narrative unfolds so seamlessly to distract you just enough so you don't see the tonal shifts coming. Bong Joon-ho's direction is great, it keeps the story moving at a fantastic pace with great cinematography and performances to compliment it. Of this list, this one is my favorite, and I recommend it to anyone who loves great storytelling. As this is a South Korean film, just be prepared to read through a lot of subtitles. Jojo Rabbit (In theaters)



This controversial Taika Waititi-directed satire might be off putting to some at face value; but trust me, it is well worth watching. In Jojo Rabbit we follow a young German boy who aspires to be a member of the Hitler Youth organization during World War II as he discovers a young Jewish girl hiding in his house. The movie carries a timeless message about tearing down blind nationalism and blindly hating on the other just because we fear the unknown. It is hilarious, uniquely directed, very well acted, knows when to balance its dark and serious moments, and the cherry on the top is that it makes fun of Nazis in the most glorious and unsubtle fashion. Having this story told from a child's perspective is really smart for the messages Waititi implements here. Even from a cinematic perspective it has a purpose, with the film being very colorful especially for a time period that is traditionally shown as dreadful and bleak. Definitely check this out as soon as possible.

Dolomite is My Name (on Netflix)



In this Netflix biographical comedy, Eddie Murphy plays the legendary Rudy Ray Moore. Moore was a singer/comedian who created the character of Dolomite and was able to navigate his way into the film world and later be known as an icon in the blaxploitation film genre. This movie details how Moore was down on his luck and had the doors slammed in his face before he decided to take matters into his own hands and showcase himself to the world. Eddie Murphy gave a fantastic performance, showcasing Moore's humor, sincerity, desperation, and determination all at the same time. This is a very funny film and surprisingly heartfelt which displays a message to viewers to always believe in yourself when no one else will.

The Lighthouse (In theaters)



Writer and Director Robert Eggers' sophomore outing "The Lighthouse," he created a psychological horror film that explores two men (William Dafoe and Robert Pattinson) who descend into madness as a storm hits the island they are stationed at. The filmmaking is unique as it is shot on black and white 35mm film; which not only gives it a classical feel, but it also contributes to the boiling intensity and insanity as we watch these men lose their minds. Pattinson and

Dafoe both give Oscar worthy performances, Dafoe specifically nailing these very intense and complex monologues that is just very impressive. The film is also very haunting. For people looking for a horror film with typical jumpscares you won't find them here; but the film does have its chilling scenes, and it presents its complicated and abstract themes in a way that will stick with you for the years to come.

Doctor Sleep

Stanley Kubrick's *The Shining* is a film that has become ingrained in pop culture and is considered to be one of the greatest horror films ever made. However, Stephen King, who wrote the novel that the film is based off of, has expressed his distaste for the film calling it too cold and emotionless, and it is not an accurate adaptation of the book.

And now thirty-nine years after the release of the film, we have Doctor Sleep, an adaption of King's book which is a sequel to The Shining book. Directed by Mike Flanagan, Doctor Sleep follows Danny Torrence (played by Ewan McGregor) as an adult after the events of The Shining. However, he stumbles upon a little girl named Abra Stone (played by Kyliegh Curran) who has the same abilities as him. Soon a group of people who are hungry for Abra's powers pursue her and it is up to Danny to save her, while confronting his own childhood trauma.

Ewan McGregor is easily the best part of the film. He perfectly displays a lot of the trauma and struggles that Danny has faced since he was a child. Within the first act, McGregor's performance tells the audience everything you need to know about his mental state and how desperately he needs to find a way to cope.

The biggest flaw with *Doctor Sleep*, is that it is trying to be a sequel to Kubrick's film, while simultaneously being an accurate adaptation of King's books. *The Shining* was a psychological horror film with supernatural elements. The ghosts and Danny's powers were there but it wasn't what provided the majority of the horror in the film. What made that film so scary was seeing Jack Torrence go crazy because of how much he hated his family. *Doctor Sleep* leans more heavily into the supernatural elements of the first film and because of this both films feel very detached.

Kubrick's cold and clinical approach to filmmaking isn't here. Instead Flanagan stays more faithful to King's book by making a more personal, but still terrifying story, which never worked with Kubrick's style of filmmaking. This is very apparent when *Doctor Sleep* begins to recreate shots and use

the score from The Shining and it loses all effect because the same context isn't there. Kubrick's The Shining observes it's characters and focuses more on atmosphere with an objective camera, while Flanagan takes a more subjective approach and allows the viewer to get into the characters' heads. Both methods work well on their own, but when watching both films back to back, I imagine the difference will be jarring.

Fans of Stephen King's two original books may be pleased with the film, however if your only knowledge of *The Shining* is from the film, you may leave the theater disappointed.



SWIMMING COLLIDES WITH LEHMAN

SUNY Old Westbury men's and women's swimming returned to the pool Wednesday evening on the road against the Lehman College Lightning (M: 1-0; W: 1-0) inside APEX Swimming Pool in Bronx, New York. Lehman swept Old Westbury (M: 0-3; W: 0-4) with a 93-60 men's score and an 83-55 women's final.

Joseph Malone led the Panther men with victories in the 1,000-yard freestyle (10:54.88; season-best) and 100-yard butterfly (1:01.18). Daniel McCartney followed by winning the 50-yard freestyle event in 23.81 (season-best) and claimed first-place points in the

100-yard breaststroke (1:08.37, season-best) while Alejandro Ruiz-Soto (50-yard freestyle, 33.93) and Tilyk Bonner (50-yard freestyle, 44.19) finshed in fourth and sixth place, respectively. Daniel Grinchenko finished in third in the 100-yard freestyle a time of 1:10.35 and placed fourth in the 200yard freestyle (2:42.11). Timothy Probst finished the 200-yard IM in 2:53.43 to place third and placed fourth in the 100-yard butterfly (1:25.13). Jassell Mateo added a sixthplace finish in the 100vard freestyle (1:28.66).

In the 200-yard freestyle relay, Ruiz-Soto, Mateo, Lorenzo Cusumano and Probst captured first-place points in a season-best time of 1:48.86.

On the women's side, Mia Hidalgo paced Old Westbury with a time of 1:30.88 (season-best) in the 100-yard breaststroke to claim first-place points while finishing in second in the 200-yard freestyle (2:41.28, season-best) and 200-yard IM (3:06.35, season-best). Adelyn Veras chipped in by claiming first-place points in the 100-yard butterfly (1:32.03, season-best), finished in second in the 100-yard backstroke (1:28.50, season-best) and captured second-place points in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:43.65). In the 50-yard freestyle event, Magan Blige (38.78), Yvette Domond (39.52), Diana Castellanos (41.06) and Domanaye Newman (54.47) placed in 5-6-7-8 for the Panthers. Dina Terki placed fourth in the 200-yard freestyle (3:22.39) and 100-yard backstroke (1:45.20). Rebecca Warshauer (1:36.08) and Castellanos (1:38.43) finished in fourth and fifth place, respectively, in the 100yard freestyle race.

The 200-yard freestyle relay squad of Magan Blige, Castellanos, Terki and Warshauer combined to finish in 2:34.70 for first-place points.
